**Prerequisites:** Advisory: English Writing 211 and Reading 211 (or Language Arts 211), or English as a Second Language 272 and 273; Mathematics 212 or equivalent.

#### Course Description (from 2015-2016 De Anza Course Catalog):

The primary objective of this course is to help students learn how accounting meets the information needs of various users by developing and communicating information that is used in decision-making. Accordingly, the expected student outcome is the demonstration that the student can read, analyze and interpret external financial statements.

### **Student Learning Outcomes (SLO's)**

- 1. Demonstrate a knowledge of double entry accounting for business transactions and adjustments and prepare, explain and analyze financial statements using GAAP.
- 2. Analyze fundamental business concepts, how businesses operate, how accounting serves them and identify ethical issues in an accounting context.

### **Student Expectations:**

I expect you to **READ** the relevant pages of the textbook <u>before</u> coming to class, attend regularly, and actively participate. The course covers quite a bit of material, *not all of which will be reviewed during class*. The lectures and class activities are designed to build upon your preparation, NOT to replace it. Class participation, in the form of answering and asking questions makes the class interactive and much more valuable.

I expect you to **COMPLETE** the homework assignments and projects AND **REVIEW** course content between classes. I recommend a <u>MINIMUM of **one and a half hours** outside of class for each hour of class time.</u>

### **Course Format & Assignments:**

- You will be expected to take your own lecture notes; I will not provide them to you.
- **Homework** will be completed through the CengageNow portal. There are 10 in total (**None** of the homework assignments will be dropped from your grade).
- Quizzes will be given for *each chapter* and will focus on your comprehension of the material being discussed in class during that week. The quizzes will be <u>unannounced</u>, each worth 5 points, and you <u>will</u> be able to drop the *two* lowest quiz scores. Quizzes <u>can't</u> be made-up, *regardless of the reason*.
- Three Midterms: Chapters 1-3, Chapters 4-6, and Chapters 7-9 (see STRICT makeup policy).
- The project will be done <u>online</u> through CengageNow. It will be given in TWO Parts.
- The final examination will be comprehensive and MUST be taken at the scheduled time

### **Grading Philosophy:**

First, and foremost, I grade based on <u>PERFORMANCE</u>, not effort. <u>YOU EARN YOUR GRADE</u>. I use total points to determine your letter grade. One of the shortcomings of using this point system to determine traditional letter grades (which are based on a percentage ranging from 50-100) is the assignment of an *individual* assignment grade less than 50%. Therefore, you will not receive anything lower than a 50% on any individual assignment, including <u>ATTENDED</u> examinations unless you violate the academic integrity policy. This process helps to assure an accurate grade based on your overall performance in the course. With this philosophy, however, there is <u>NO</u> place for any extra credit assignments, additional projects and <u>NO</u> assignment due date extensions. The ONLY exception to this is the <u>Adjunct Skills Program</u>, which CAN provide *up to* 5 additional points.

#### **Strict Make-up Policy:**

Given the fact that you will not receive lower than a 50% on any assignment, I will NOT take <u>any late</u> <u>homework, quizzes, examinations, or projects</u>. You will be notified in advance of the four examination dates and need to make <u>every effort</u> to attend these dates. Examination make-ups are ONLY allowed:

- School required absences such as field trips and athletic events, **not** including practice. Make-ups that are allowed must be arranged <u>at least</u> **two** weeks in **advance**.
- Emergencies (accidents or **serious** illnesses) which MUST be accompanied by **written support from a third party** such as an accident report, doctor's note, etc. These emergencies will be very RARE and given their nature will not be known about in advance. You must contact me and inform me of the situation <u>no later than 24 hours after the scheduled date of the exam</u> that was missed. After notifying me, you must schedule a make-up ASAP. IF you do not make an effort to re-schedule your exam to be taken <u>within 1 week from the missed exam</u>, you will no longer be entitled to a make-up.
- Make sure you provide *multiple* modes transportation on exam days and arrive EARLY

#### Attendance and On Time Arrival/Departure:

I work hard to make sure that class time is valuable. I expect you to make every effort to attend class ON TIME and for the ENTIRE TIME. It is <u>very distracting</u> to me and the other students when you arrive late or leave early. I will also make every effort to start and end class on time. You will NOT be given extra time for class quizzes and examinations if you come in tardy or have to leave early.

## Academic Integrity:

I expect examinations, homework, quizzes, and projects will honestly reflect your own learning and knowledge in this course. You are allowed to <u>consult</u> each other with homework and the project, but I do expect that <u>you</u> will ultimately be completing these assignments, not copying them.

Plagiarism constitutes taking someone else's ideas as your own even if you do not use the exact same wording. Anytime you use someone else's ideas or words, you need to provide the necessary references and citations. Plagiarism includes (but is not limited to) having somebody else write your essay or memorandum for you or using an essay or memorandum or taking bits and pieces (without citing them) from any informational source (such as the Internet, a book, a magazine, a newspaper, and so forth). Cheating constitutes copying work from another student and displaying it in full or in part on your exam. If a student is caught plagiarizing or cheating, the student will receive a **ZERO** on the assignment or exam and will be reported to administration (which may eventually result in dismissal from the course and potentially from the College).

### **Classroom Behavior:**

I expect you to act <u>respectfully and responsibly</u> at all times in this classroom. This is a learning environment, and you will behave accordingly. All of our time is valuable and everyone deserves to be treated with respect. Accordingly, any disrespectful or irresponsible class behavior will not be tolerated. Students who engage in this behavior may be asked to leave the classroom, and if the behavior continues, may be eventually dropped from the course. Examples of disrespectful or irresponsible behavior include (but are not limited to):

- USE OF CELLULAR DEVICES (turn them <u>off</u> at the door; you can use them at the break)
- side conversations
- sleeping
- eating or drinking (other than water)
- reading material not related to this class (magazines, newspapers, other textbooks)
- refusing to participate in class assignments
- surfing the web (use of computers is allowed for note taking, but it is disrespectful and irresponsible, not to mention a distraction to the students around you, if you are surfing the web)
- Excessive emails to instructor
- Monopolizing class time through excessive questions or responses

### Withdrawal

It is the <u>student's responsibility</u> to drop a class. Therefore, **if you wish to drop this course, you need to drop it; I will not drop you.** The only exception is that <u>I WILL drop a student that does not show up for the</u> <u>first class.</u>
