Course Description:

This is the second part of two-quarter intermediate accounting series and the main focus of the course is on liabilities, equity and related expense accounts and their related measurement and reporting issues (9 chapters from Ch.13 to Ch.22 except for Ch.18). By the end of the quarter, you will have gained in-depth understanding of more complex accounting topics such as current and long-term liabilities, shareholders' equity and EPS, investments, pensions, leases, and income taxes.



Student Learning Outcomes:

- Understand and apply acceptable accounting and disclosure practices for a variety of current liabilities and contingencies.
- Understand how to calculate and account for long term debt instruments such as bonds.
- Assess the characteristics, advantages and disadvantages of the corporate form of business enterprise and explain various related accounting issues such as, cash and stock dividends, stock splits and appropriation of retained earnings.
- Discuss accounting issues related to dilutive securities, such as stock options, and calculate earnings per share.
- Understand and apply investment-related accounting principles.
- Assess the impact of income tax laws on financial statements and understand related accounting issues.
- Measure the cost of pension plans and discuss the related accounting issues.
- Understand and apply the lease accounting principles.
- Understand the types and accounting issues of accounting changes and correction of errors.

Course Format:

The course is a lecture course and will be of a "half-flipped classroom" format which is made up of lectures, illustrations, in-class exercises, group discussions, pre-class (optional) and in-class quizzes, post-class homework assignments, and additional readings – all of which are intended to reinforce your *pre-class reading* of each chapter. **Pre-class preparation, attendance, and timely completion of post-class homework assignments** will be critical to your success in this course.

In-class Quizzes:

There will be *eight* 10-point quizzes in class (Ch.13 – Ch.21) which will focus on measuring your comprehension of the subjects of each chapter. They will also serve as small sample tests and tools for group discussions. It is recommended that you complete homework assignment of the related chapter before each in-class quiz is taken.

There will be no makeup without any exception.



Post-class Homework:

Homework will be assigned (8 in total, one 15-point assignment for each chapter (Ch.13 – Ch.21) through *WileyPlus*. The assignments will be due a few nights before the exam covering corresponding chapters but you should carefully check the due date of each assignment posted in *WileyPlus* as no late submissions will be accepted.

It is important to *stay current* with all homework assignments and you are strongly advised to complete them as early as possible – it will be ideal if you work on the assignment while we discuss the corresponding chapter in class and *finish it before* we start discussing the next chapter and before in-class quiz is scheduled for the chapter.

Midterm Exams:

There will be two closed-book midterm exams (80 points each) and **no make-up** will be given except for the situations stated below in "Make-up for Midterm Exams" section.

Final Exam:

This is a 2-hour long comprehensive closed-book final exam covering all 9 chapters discussed during the quarter. As stated in the school webpage, *you are responsible for taking the final exam at the time pre-scheduled by the school*. Refer to the course calendar at the end for more details or the school webpage.

Extra Credits (24 points in total):

Pre-class preparation is so crucial for your successful completion of this course and extra credit will be provided to encourage everyone to read chapters *before* we discuss in class.

There will be 8 **pre-class online quizzes** posted in *WileyPlus* (one 3-point timed-quiz for each chapter (*Ch.14 – Ch.22*). Each quiz will be *due 2 hours before we start discussing the corresponding chapter in class* and it will be open and available in *WileyPlus* for 48 hours. It is your responsibility to find the quizzes and complete them during this time window as no late submissions will be accepted. These quizzes will also be used to measure your preparation level for the related chapters and we will allocate our class discussion time based on the results.

If you want to take on more assignments/projects for more extra credit, discuss it with the instructor. You may get additional extra credit up to 10 points.

Attendance:

Regular attendance is an obligation assumed by you at the time of registration and it is an integral part of your learning process. Students' Other Responsibilities:
