Subject: Implications of San Jose Transfer Impaction

Important Highlights:

- De Anza College transfers the highest number of upper division transfer students to SJSU of any feeder school, about 800 students yearly on average.
- De Anza's transfer students tend to have GPAs above the CSU admission requirement of 2.0, therefore, only about 9% or 76 of our 2010-11 transfer students would have been affected by the changes in admission requirements.
- Spring 2013 is closed to transfer students, this will likely impact the greatest number of De Anza students. On average, 38% or about 300 of our students transfer to SJSU each spring.
- When spring transfer was closed in 2009-10, De Anza transferred only 452 students compared to 773 the previous year. However, students who did not transfer in the spring likely transferred in the fall as exhibited in a doubling of fall 2010 transfers. What is important to consider is that students not able to transfer in the spring will have to postpone transfer until the fall which may have negative impacts on their college-going momentum.
- International students will not be affected by any admission changes, international transfer students who meet the 2.4 GPA and 60 unit requirements are automatically admitted to the university.

Admissions Policy

San Jose State University (SJSU) recently declared all majors impacted, including "Undeclared". Currently, applicants are ranked by their self-reported GPA and must compete for available spots within each impacted major. There is no local service area preference calculated into this process.

SJSU is considering establishing a minimum eligibility index where transfer applicants who do not meet major admission requirements are admitted to the university as an "Undeclared" major. These spots are based on the universities enrollment capacity. Students in this category are given service area priority over non service area applicants. Once admitted as "Undeclared", there is no guarantee that any of these students will be able to enter into a major.

De Anza Transfers to SJSU

De Anza College transfers the highest number of upper division transfer students to SJSU of any feeder school. 27% of all upper division transfer students enrolled at SJSU in 2010-11 were from De Anza College.

Students transferring to SJSU are from a wide variety of ethnic backgrounds. In 2010-11, 39% of students identified as Asian, 24% as White, 13% Latino, 7% non-resident alien, and 2% as Black.

De Anza Transfer Students by Major and GPA

Table 2 provides a breakdown of De Anza transfer students by major who passed a transfer level math or English course between 2010M and 2011S and were found in the National Student Clearing House database in March 2012 as enrolled at SJSU.

Based on their GPA at De Anza, 9% (76 out of 809) of students in the 2010-11 cohort would not have met the fall 2012 GPA requirements by major. However, students may enroll at SJSU with a different major than the one declared at De Anza, therefore this is only a rough approximation of who may be affected.

Students Not Meeting GPA Requirements by Ethnicity

Of the 76 students who potentially did not meet the SJSU 2012F GPA requirement by major, 34% are Asian, 29% are Latino, 16% are White, 8% did not report their ethnicity, 7% are Filipino, 4% African American and 3% Native American.

Spring 2013 Closed to Transfers

SJSU will not be accepting spring 2013 applicants. As displayed in Table 4, on average, 38% of De Anza students transferred to SJSU in the spring semester between 2006-07 and 2008-09. In 2009-10, SJSU closed spring admissions resulting in a large drop in annual transfers from De Anza. However, fall 2010 transfers nearly doubled from previous years, likely due to spring transfers enrolling at that time. This policy will likely have a negative impact on students ready to transfer in the spring who must now wait until the fall.
