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ESL 005 is a reading and composition class designed to prepare you for the types of expository reading and writing assignments encountered in other college classes. This includes practice of the techniques of expository and argumentative writing based on personal experience, critical reading, and critical thinking.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. Analyze and evaluate college-level fiction and nonfiction texts
2. Write essays, including research-based writing, demonstrating academic rhetorical strategies and documentation
3. Demonstrate college-level grammar, sentence structure, and vocabulary in writing

REQUIRED MATERIALS:

Voices and Values by Goldstein and Langan

The Samurai's Garden by Gail Tsukiyama

Longman Academic Writing Series 5 by Alan Meyers

PREREQUISITES:

English as a Second Language 273 and 272 or a qualifying score on the English as a Second Language placement test

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. You will complete five compositions. All essays except the research paper need to be two-three pages, double-spaced. The research essay requirement is four-five pages, excluding the Works Cited page.
 - a. Three of the five compositions will be produced outside of class.
 - b. Two of the five compositions will be timed essays based on readings.
2. We will be reading the novel *The Samurai's Garden*. It is important to come prepared to participate in the scheduled group discussions. The novel will be the basis for the literary analysis essay.
3. An individual presentation based on research findings will be assigned.

GRADING GUIDELINES:

Your grade will be based on the following:

1. Problem/Solution Essay	15%
2. Literary Analysis Essay	15%
3. Research Paper	20%
4. Timed In-Class Essays	25%
5. Research Presentation	15%
6. Participation	10%

ESSAY REQUIREMENTS:

- Essay Length: Each essay needs to include a minimum of five paragraphs with an introduction, body paragraphs, and a conclusion. All essays need to be two-three pages minimum. The research paper needs to be four-five pages minimum. This excludes the Works Cited page.
- Format: All essays need to be double spaced in 12 font and include a Works Cited page listing the sources used in MLA format. Indent each paragraph and use one- inch margins for each assignment.

ASSIGNMENTS POLICY:

You are required to complete all assignments by the due date. Ten percent will be deducted for each day an assignment is submitted late. Assignments will not be accepted more than three days late.

EXAMS:

There are no make-up exams except in cases of emergency. Suitable documentation must be provided.

ATTENDANCE:

If you miss more than three class meetings for any reason, you may be dropped from the class. If you stop coming to class, it is your responsibility to drop.

CHEATING AND PLAGIARISM:

Plagiarism is presenting another's work as your own or copying sentences, phrases, or passages from a source without crediting the author. Anyone engaging in cheating or plagiarism in any form will receive no credit for the assignment or exam.

PARTICIPATION:

You will often work with other classmates in pairs or small groups to share ideas and discuss homework. It is important that you come to class prepared to actively participate in class discussions. Failure to do so may lower your grade.
