COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Human Sexuality is the comprehensive study of the biological, psychological and socio- cultural aspects of human sexuality. It's an exploration into values and attitudes and their relationship to behaviors and behavioral changes. Includes an assessment of various cultural mores and current safe sex practices.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOME (SLO):

Examine and synthesize the social, cultural, and physiological implications in the field of human sexuality; and demonstrate the ability to analyze and respond to complex issues related to human sexuality in all assignments.

Course Objectives • Course Information:

- A. Examine the field of human development as a behavioral science and its interdisciplinary components the inter-relationships between the cognitive and affective domains and their impact on behavior.
- B. Identify the major components of the male and female sexual anatomy and explain the physiological processes that mediate sexual activity using the language of the human development discipline, to include the concept of gender.
- C. Compare and contrast the various contraception methods currently available for men and women; history of contraception to include natural and surgical methods, as well as historical and cross cultural views on abortion as a form of contraception.
- D. Describe psycho-physical and psycho-social changes that occur at each stage of sexual development (birth, early childhood, pre-teen, adolescence) to include hygiene and sex education.
- E. Identify the main categories of sexual behavior and recognize their biological, psychological, and cultural determinants.
- F. Illustrate global perspectives on cultural diversity within the discipline using a variety of multicultural/multiethnic examples.
- G. Recognize the incidence, symptoms, causes, treatment, and prevention of major sexual infections as well as attitudes, myths, and stereotypes.
- H. Analyze, interpret, examine and draw conclusions from evidence and current perspectives regarding the impact of media and morality as it pertains to sexual behavior.
- I. Analyze patterns of various sexual relationships and interactions from a multicultural perspective such as dating, cohabitation, marriage, and divorce.
- J. Compare given sets of criteria upon which ethical, moral, judgments, and decisions about sexual behavior and responsibility are made.

Note: Material that may be considered controversial and explicit topics and lifestyles will be presented in the textbook, readings and online discussions, videos, and presentations.

METHODOLOGY:

This is an online course, zoom meetings (Tuesdays and Thursdays 9:30am to 10:20am) together with online readings and e-textbook and assignments accessed on the Canvas platform (100% online); no face-to-face meetings. Canvas for the course will be accessible in the class listing via MyPortal, as well as directly via the Canvas platform https://deanza.instructure.com/ Note: once students enter via the MyPortal hyperlink, the course with active code number will be identified in the URL bar.

Certain assignments will involve having conversations with others, some online with the instructor and fellow students and others with persons outside the course (Decades Project); the assignment instructions will specify.

Note, all submitted/typed assignments are to be typed in Arial Font, Size 12 and uploaded only as pdf, doc, docx or rtf (do not submit "pages" or other document types).

Pay attention to due dates and time: assignments are due on a specific Tuesday and must be submitted by 9:59 pm, unless otherwise noted. The Midterm and Final Exam will take place online; follow the instructions and guidelines carefully.

PAY ATTENTION TO ALL DUE DATE/TIMES (NO EXTENSIONS, NO EXCEPTIONS)

CREDIT IS BASED UPON:

- Satisfactory performance on the exams (up to 100 points per exam)
- Participation in online dialogues and discussions, including with the instructor and fellow students.
- Completion of chapter post-tests within the Revel program on Canvas
- Completion of two major assignments, details provided on Canvas. Ask instructor for clarifications.
- Extra credit assignments may be assigned to the class. Individual extra credit assignments are not an option.
- All points earned will be counted towards the final course grade. Each student earns their grade.
- Choosing not to complete assignments is choosing not to earn points towards the final course grade.

POINT ALLOCATION:

- All assignments are to be submitted before the due dates to ensure earning a higher grade; planning to wait until a due date often leads to late assignments and lower grades (late = non-graded).
- It is the student's responsibility to verify that the instructor has received and marked in all work
 of the student.
- Assignments and Examinations will be graded as soon as possible and entered in Canvas.
- Errors in grading should be brought to the instructor's attention within seven days of return and may initiate re-grading of the entire exam or assignment.
- After the final exam, all points earned will be added into the grand total and grades will be assigned. NOTE 1: Letter grades are entered into MyPortal, based upon the total number of points earned in all assignments received. (Pay attention to your individual and Total Points scores
 - NOTE: the per cent column is not accurate; grades are based upon Total Points
- Manage your time wisely to submit assignments timely and well (formatting and late penalties apply).
- No extensions to any due date and/or due time; there is sufficient time allocated for each assignment.
- If a student has any questions or concerns, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor.
- If a student chooses to drop the class, the student must officially drop the lass via the Office of Admissions and Records, or on MyPortal, or risk receiving a grade of F.

IMPORTANT GRADING NOTES:

- All written work in this class, must be typed/word processed using black ink, Arial Font, Size 12, paragraph format, double-spaced, using formal tone and language (no lists). Assignments are graded on quality, supported facts, clarity. Supported personal analysis and opinions should be provided at the end of the assignment in separate paragraphs, using first-person formal tone and language. There should be a clear, logical development of information. Answer questions in the order asked. Answer questions, as asked. Stay on topic/focus. Any personal knowledge examples are to be detailed at the end of the assignment in a separate paragraph.
- All work is to be paraphrased, no quotes. <u>No plagiarism</u>. Plagiarized work will earn a grade of "0"/F for that assignment. All data and unique statements are to have sources cited (author, year), with the full citation provided at the end of the assignment.
- Penalties: Grading rubrics will be provided with each assignment. Pay attention to all due dates and criteria, including for missing, incomplete and insufficient work, as well as for late penalties, if any.

GRADING POLICY:

Grade points are as follows (based upon a total of 700 points): 630-700 = "A" (90%), 560-629 = "B" (80%), 455-559 = "C" (65%), 350-454 = "D" (50%), 0-349 = "F"

There will be no extra credit given (unless offered to the entire class) and no makeup tests nor extra time allowed nor extensions applied, no exceptions! Students will have at least a 2-week time period to submit assignments and to take exams. One may exit and re-enter quizzes and exams; remember to press submit when complete. It is the student's responsibility to submit work timely.

HONORS COHORT:

An Honors cohort is offered in this section. If you have an area of interest that you would like to pursue, speak with your instructor ASAP to discuss the possibility of working on an honors project within this course. There are requirements which must be met to gain permission and registration as honors: obtaining permission from the Honors program, speaking with the instructor of this course to discuss the potential contract and additional work to be completed and registration must be completed by April 16, 2022. If you are already in the Honors Program, you are welcome to participate in the cohort after having a conversation with the instructor in regard to the contract and completing the registration procedures.

Eligibility requirements for all students may be found at https://www.deanza.edu/honors/index.html If interested, speak with your instructor and request an add code and contact the Honors Program for permission to "release" the add (or the code will not work):

- speak with the instructor to discuss your interests and types of assignments that may be assigned to meet the commitments.
- email <u>dahonors@deanza.edu</u> with your name, SID, and the Honors course you are interested in registering as an honors cohort.
- Registration into HUMA 10H.02Z must be initiated by Sept 30th and completed no later than the second Friday of the quarter (Oct 7th, 2022).
- Once registered, the course cannot be changed back to HUMA 10.02Z.

The honors cohort entails additional work in order to earn an Honors designation for this class on your transcript. Once you commit to the Honors portion, you will be expected to complete the extra work (you will sign a contract detailing the agreed upon assignments). Failure to complete the Honors work will result in a lowering of your Honors course grade. Students must be properly approved for the honors cohort course by the end of the first week of classes, and fully registered by the second Friday of the course. Thus, time is of the essence. Once registered, you are to meet with the instructor to develop and sign the contract, detailing the extra work that has been agreed to be completed. The course grade cannot be raised by the points earned by the honors work; however, not completing the work outlined in the Honors Contract will result in a lowered course grade. Having Honors coursework and being in the Honors program has several benefits. Check out the Honors program website and speak with their advisors.

Past honors students have worked with the instructor to pursue their interests in a variety of media and modes. Generally, two conversations will take place prior to agreeing to a contract. The first conversation is to express interests and possible types of assignments, which may include library research, interviews with individuals working in related careers, watching relevant film(s), and/or volunteer work in the relevant field, as well as written report(s) and possible initiation of Canvas Discussions related to the topic. Details will be worked out prior to finalization of the Honors Contract. The instructor looks forward to working with students toward successful completion of their Honors projects.

- Welcome to the Digital textbook (access via the Canvas course through MyPortal or the Canvas app, click on Pearson-Revel on the left course navigation bar). The e-textbook is low cost at the De Anza bookstore (\$49.99); purchase ASAP and register with the access code to help ensure timely reading of each chapter and the respective Chapter Review Quiz.
 - Purchasing directly from Revel (\$79.99) access is automatic, no access code required.
- While awaiting receipt of the access card (emailed/snail-mailed by the De Anza bookstore)
 - O students may sign up for two (2) weeks free trial access to the e-textbook
 - Registration instructions are located in the 1st Module of our Canvas course

Please read the textbook in a timely fashion; pay attention to due dates within Revel, as well as each of the assignments. The course is designed for the textbook to be read in full, such that a solid foundation of Human Sexuality is built. Ask questions via email (use Canvas Inbox) and appointments (via email or telephone Thursdays 10am to 12pm). My goal is to have each student understand themselves and others; agree to disagree....

During the course, each of the chapters are always available to read and/or be listened to using the REVEL student app on mobile devices.

• The chapter Review Quizzes are required and graded.

Other than the first e-textbook assignments, these post-tests are each available three weeks prior to their respective due dates. Access to these post-tests will cease by 9:59 pm on each respective chapter due date, no exceptions. Do take advantage of the other features, including the videos, to further your learning experience.

The course is designed to cover certain areas in-depth via discussions. The textbook will give a general overview and depth into certain areas, further meeting CSU Outline requirements. Participation is part of the grade; active participation enhances learning and life experiences. Take part in less formal chat with fellow students within the Q&A and Lounge discussions; you may begin topics for discussion as well as ask and answer questions posed. Please be respectful and responsible.

Note: As the information within the rubric of Human Sexuality is vast and inter-related, read and participate for increasing knowledge and understanding of the diversity of subject matter and decisions. Remember, each person has had many influences in life; their decisions may not be yours and yours may not be theirs. Consider and express your boundaries in social interactions, as well as your "negotiables" and non-negotiables when choosing those with whom you may have a relationship of any type.
