<u>REQUISITE</u>: (This is a noncredit enchanced, basic skills course.) **<u>PREREQUISITE</u>:** ESL 244 or ESL 444 or a qualifying score on the English as a Second Language Placement Test. **Repeatability:** (No limit on student re-enrollment for 0 unit courses.)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Description: This course develops high-intermediate reading comprehension, vocabulary, and writing skills using high-intermediate grammar. Students will be able to write well-organized and well-developed descriptive, narrative, and explanatory paragraphs.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES (SLOS):

The student will:

- Develop high intermediate English reading comprehension skills and vocabulary building skills in extended written materials.
- Demonstrate understanding and usage of high intermediate vocabulary in readings and writing.
- Write well-developed, single and connected narrative, descriptive, and explanatory paragraphs demonstrating high intermediate grammar and vocabulary in response to reading materials.
- Evaluate own writing for rhetorical structure, clarity, organization, and grammatical correctness by means of revision and editing.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- Demonstrate reading comprehension for both content and organization of high-intermediate reading materials by using a variety of reading skills.
- Expand high frequency words, academic vocabulary, and idioms.
- Demonstrate knowledge and skills in using high intermediate sentences and paragraphs free of major/global errors that interfere with meaning.
- Write organized and well-developed single and connected paragraphs of description, narration, and explanations that reflect diverse perspectives and demonstrate topic unity based on readings.
- Evaluate own writing for content, clarity, punctuation, spelling, and grammatical correctness by means of revision and editing.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOKS AND MATERIALS:

- Focus on Grammar 4 (the access code will be given in class)
- A good English-English dictionary (e.g. Longman, Newbury House or Merriam-Webster)
- Binder paper to take notes and a 3-ring binder to keep all your materials organized

ATTENDANCE / PARTICIPATION / ACADEMIC HONESTY:

- You must come on time to every class. If you miss more than three class meetings for any reason, you will be dropped from the class, receive a "W" or fail the class, depending on the day of your fourth absence. Four late arrivals to class will count as one absence.
- You are expected to attend all class meetings and come to class prepared every day. If you are absent, it is your responsibility to get the assignments from your classmates or group members, get the assignment for the following class and come to class prepared.

- **Tests and quizzes**: Scheduled and unannounced tests and quizzes will be given throughout the quarter. Tests and quizzes cannot be made up.
- **Homework**: You will receive various homework assignments every week. Most of these assignments will be related to other subsequent assignments or in-class activities, so be sure to do all your homework. Your homework will be randomly checked.
- *Writing assignments*: You will have several writing assignments throughout the quarter. Some of them will be written in class while others will be written at home. Assignments cannot be made up. All take home assignments must be typed.
- **Take home assignments** are to be typed and are due at the beginning of class period. Always keep a copy of assignments submitted for grading.
- Passing grade: Please note that <u>you need to earn at least 73% to pass the course</u>. If you do not earn at least 60% on your homework and tests, you may need to repeat the class.
- Plagiarism: <u>Only your original writing is graded</u>. <u>Any attempt to cheat may result in an F and/or drop from the</u> <u>course</u>. Review De Anza Student Standards Handbook: cheating and plagiarism are serious offenses and will be treated as such. If you plagiarize, your work will not be graded (will receive 0 points) and you will not be able to revise/make up the assignment. Appropriate remedial and disciplinary steps will be followed if/when violations occur. Disciplinary actions may be initiated at the first offense.
- **Participation and collaboration**: You will be required to participate in a variety of listening, speaking, reading and writing activities in class. Most of your class work will be in pairs or groups and your collaborative work will be evaluated for your participation grade. These activities are designed to help you and your classmates understand the material at hand and improve your language skills, so your participation and collaboration is very important. Show interest by asking and answering questions, and volunteering your opinions and ideas about the subject discussed. Be sure to attend every class and participate in all activities. Observe group discussion rules. If you are absent get your assignments from your team member.
