#### **Course Description**

This course provides students with an introduction to the fundamentals of personal finance. Students will learn about the various important topics such as time value of money, consumer credit, insurance, taxes, and investing. This class is entirely online with no in-person meetings required. The course will be hosted on De Anza's online course management system called Canvas. - Prepare, explain and analyze personal financial statements including the balance sheet and cash flow statement.
- Analyze and evaluate various savings, investment, and insurance options.

# **Course Requirements**

**Reading:** Each week you will have approximately 2-3 chapters to master. (Don't worry, the chapters are short.) You should read the assigned textbook chapters, and then review any associated materials for the week.

**Weekly Assignment (100 Points Total):** *Most* weeks you will also be expected to complete one online assignment or class discussion in addition to the assigned reading. The assignments are varied, but they are always meant to be practical rather than theoretical. This class is all about providing you with useful information that will be valuable to you now or at some point in the future. Your grades for these assignments will be evaluated according to the Rubric provided in the table below. (*Note that I am looking for quality, not quantity. Also, make sure to answer all parts of the assignment.*)
