Course Description

This course emphasizes listening comprehension and proficiency in speaking in academic settings, and expression of students' ideas using a variety of speaking strategies, along with development of vocabulary, pronunciation and note-taking skills. Students will increase their ability to understand conversations through structured and communicative activities. Whether you are taking the class for credit or noncredit, the course requirements will be exactly the same. We will work as a class as well as independently, in pairs, and in small groups. Materials will include class handouts, textbook exercises, podcasts, TED talks, news reports and more. You should plan on spending at

least four hours per week outside of class doing homework and reviewing and practicing class materials.
