Course Description

This is the beginning drawing course that focuses on the representation and interpretation of the human figure; with attention to drawing from life.

Weekly Student Hours

3 Lecture Hours, 3 Lab Hours, totally 12 Hours per week

Course Objectives

- Demonstrate ability to create a representational drawing of the human figure.
- Demonstrate ability to create interpretive, expressionistic drawings of the human figure.
- Demonstrate fundamental knowledge of the human anatomy.
- Incorporate historical and contemporary approaches to drawing the human figure.
- Demonstrate the creative process.
- Experiment with color to render and complement the human figure.
- Compare and contrast figurative works of art representing a diversity of art traditions and cultures

CSLOs

- Reproduce the human figure using a variety of drawing techniques using a variety of media including charcoal, graphite, ink, or conte crayon.
- Create drawings that show an understanding of basic human anatomy and proportion.

In-Person Course Structure

- **In-Person Class Meetings:** our listed class meetings happen in person on campus. Students are required to come to each class on time. <u>Attendance is mandatory</u>
- **Canvas:** This course resides on the course management system called Canvas. It is accessible from *MyPortal*. Weekly announcements and reminders will be posted.
- Learning Equipment: (1) Device. Students are highly encouraged to use a computer to access Canvas. The interface of Canvas on phone/tablet is more difficult to navigate. (2) Stable internet (3) Camera to photograph finished work to upload onto Canvas if needed
- Homework: Most of the homework can be completed in class. Some drawings require
 extra time outside of class. All homework will be evaluated and graded within one week
 after submission.
- Instructional Feedback/Guidance: Students are encouraged to ask questions in class or message through Canvas Inbox. Weekly office hours are held in person and virtually. For questions sent online, please expect 48 hours to have your questions answered.
- Peer Support- Discussions & Critiques: For homework, students will post their artworks in Discussions under Canvas. Students' support for their peers is essential to our community and is part of the course grade. Participate in discussions and critiques to receive points.
- Midterm Critique & Final Critique: Midterm Critique and Final Critique will be conducted in person where students provide feedback for their peers. Students' comments will be graded. Detailed instructions will be given.
- 1-1 Meeting: This meeting is optional. Students can sign up for an individual meeting after midterm critique to discuss their course performance and ask questions about artrelated fields/classes
- Weekly Office Hours (both in-person and virtual through Zoom): Instructor will host
 weekly in-person office hours on campus and virtual office hours virtually through Zoom.
 Drop in any time during this period.

Participation & Engagement

- Students are expected to come to class on time with the necessary materials and remain in class until the class is officially dismissed. Students are asked to make full use of studio drawing time and actively engaged in all coursework. <u>Any personal appointments</u> should be made at times other than class time
- When a student has to miss a class, it is the student's responsibility to make up all work missed due to absences (excused or unexcused), and to make arrangements with the

- instructor in the case of excessive absences due to serious illness or other unexpected, compelling issues
- Participation & contribution in class is important, which includes a mature and responsible approach to the subject, to the instructor, and to one's peers. <u>Please remain</u> <u>supportive and respectful with your verbal comments during critiques and written</u> <u>comments online in Canvas</u>
- To maintain physical and emotional health, students are recommended to set a daily/weekly routine to balance school, work, health, family responsibilities and leisure
- Communicate and reach out for help when you need help
- Remind yourself to take breaks from screens

- To understand a variety of drawing techniques and to produce quality work, students are expected to have all required art materials for this course
- NO PHONES. Make sure your phones are put away before our models start posing.
 Please turn off or silence your cell phone. If you have to answer to phone call, you need to walk out of the classroom before answering. This is to protect our models and prevent students from taking unauthorized pictures
- Do not engage the models in conversation while they are posing. Also, be mindful
 that some models may prefer solitude during their breaks. Be respectful of the
 models' boundaries, keeping your distance, never moving in closely. Contact
 instructor if you need help. The model breaks every 20 minutes
- Once the model starts posing, please limit talking to your classmates. Respect others that prefer to work quietly
- If you come late, please enter the class quietly and remain quiet. Do not set up in a noisy way if the model is posing. Respect the model and your classmates by not disrupting their concentration during poses
- Personal music listening devices with earbuds are not allowed. They can be used at certain times, when specified by the instructor
- **Masking** might be required by models' request. Please pay attention to class announcements
- No food or drinks in classroom (except for water in bottles with secure lids). Please do not wear strong perfumes or colognes in class
- Studio set-up and clean-up. Students are responsible for cleaning all tables/drawing horses and keeping the sink area clean
- Please wear art-friendly clothing. Art materials will stain fabrics and footwear
