STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- **Student Learning Outcome:** The successful student will employ a basic vocabulary of common music terms to describe observations of recorded and live music.
- **Student Learning Outcome:** The successful student will recognize individual instruments and voices and the various ensembles in which they are used.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction to the discipline of music through the study of rock music, its predecessors and related forms. The emphases of this course are the elements of the music itself- the instruments, structural elements, rhythm, melody, vocal characteristics, etc., as well as the cultural, political and historical contexts and the agents of change and transformation that all music undergoes.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Employ a basic vocabulary of common music terms to describe observations of recorded and live music.
2. Recognize individual instruments and voices and the various ensembles in which they are used.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of the roles of music in human cultures and relate musical expression to other forms of artistic expression and to culture generally.
4. Listen to - and study - a variety of songs, recognizing basic distinguishing characteristics and placing them into historical context.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

PARTICIPATION

Everything included in the text, listening, lectures and discussions may be on examinations. In order to help motivate you to earn the highest grade possible, you are graded on participation. You earn 2 bonus points per class session (40 maximum), if you arrive on time and participate positively. Up to 50 points may be lost for each class session where instructor deems student unfit for class participation. Beginning with 4th absence or tardy: 25 points deducted from participation grade for each instance. Inconsistent attendance patterns and/or lack of positive participation may result in removal from class and/or failure.

QUIZZES

Dates and content of quizzes will be announced. Normally quizzes will confirm understanding of the reading assignments and song identifications by listening.

SONG CARDS

No more than two song per album; try to vary the styles as much as possible

Each song card should contain ALL the following:

Band/Artist	(real name if stage name; all personnel if a band)
Name of song	(name of album or show if the song is part of it)
Year song written	(perhaps a different year than when released)
Songwriter(s)	(if different from performer(s))
Label	(company and/or individuals responsible for production)
Genre	(blues, jazz, folk, psychedelic, protest, metal etc.)
Rhythm	(Meter; Tempo; other features)
Sound	(Instrumentation; Voicing; Effects)

Each song card should contain at least two of the following (at least 10 cards must contain form):

Form	(such as: intro, verse(s), chorus(es)/refrains, bridge(s) coda)
Music analysis	(Melody/Harmony/Chord progression information)
Lyrics/info	(deeper/general meaning and purpose of words)
Background info	(special info surrounding the piece or artist(s))

CONCERT REPORTS: CRITERIA AND DATES

You must get approval by Dr. Glasman BEFORE the concert. (select concert by May 1, 2024)
Concert review must be typed (double spaced) and must include the following (in essay form):

- 1) Date, Time, Location and Performer(s)
- 2) Information on Audience (number, ages, social class, behavior etc.)
- 3) Songs performed (program or setlist.fm)
- 4) Overall assessment of program
- 5) Selected portion(s) of the program should be analyzed in detail

Reviews are due one week after concert. Unacceptable reviews will be returned with the comment: "visit WRC (864-5840) www.faculty.deanza.fhda.edu/writingcenter/ and turn in again within one week." Requests for a one-week extension will be granted for all reviews provided the student agrees to have paper proofread at center.

PROJECT

Each team will be responsible for a short presentation covering the music of a particular band or style. Dr. Glasman will approve content of presentation.

Supporting document(s) will need to be duplicated and handed out to the class PRIOR to the presentation. Details will be discussed during an upcoming class session. Scoring criteria as follows:

- 1) Can be spoken, played and/or shown.
- 2) Needs accompanying document with summary and/or guide to further info
- 3) 10-20 points deduction if presentation is not clear; -5 for each disturbance
- 4) 10 points, per minute, deduction for not sticking to time regulation (8-12 minutes)
- 5) maximum 50 points deduction for erroneous or misleading information
- 6) maximum 25 points deduction for pronunciation errors and/or directly reading
- 7) 50 points deducted if document is not properly distributed prior to presentation
