Course Description

EWRT 1A-LART 250 is a dual-course that combines 3 units of LART250 (Academic Reading and Writing) and 5 units of EWRT1A (Composition and Reading). This combination is designed to improve your skills of college-level reading, analysis, and composition. The assignments for the two parts of this course are integrated, and the objectives of the courses are complementary. You will find all EWRT1A and most LART250 assignments on Canvas. Most LART250 exercises and activities will be discussed during our in-person meetings.

Bear in mind that this is a hybrid, 8-unit course. For every unit hour, you are expected to study twice as long outside of class. Therefore, expect to spend at least 15-20 hours on completing the assignments for this course to achieve a successful outcome.

Revision: The in-class essay may not be revised. Take-home essays will be submitted through a multi-draft process. I strongly recommend that you take advantage of both NetTutor and WRC services before submitting take home essays.

<u>Peer-Review Process</u>: Several of assignments of the course require peer-review in which case you will be assigned peer work to review and give feedback to. The peer-review must be thorough and detailed to receive full credit, i.e., the rubric needs to be filled out with detailed comments as well as other needed suggestions. You will receive more detailed instruction for each assignment.
